Dr. Trevor Ward, by an excellent series of colour slides, showed his proficiency as a geologist in the description of the structures of the W. coast strip of Sutherland, where the Durness limestone, of Cambrian age, outcrops along a narrow strip from L. Errol to Skye, between the Lewisian Gneiss and Torridon Sandstone on the west and the bedrock structure capped by overlying Moine Schists on the east. The cases of the Durness region and the Assynt region were described and illustrated, with specific reference to the thrust planes which often control their development. Special discussion based on large scale surveys ensued.

G.B. Cavern and Hillock's Mine.

Both these are relatively easy, and we hope that newcomers to the club will support these meets. We will be shown round G.B. by Dr. Oliver Lloyd of the Bristol U.C.C. which has the sole right of access. The cave consists mainly of large chambers containing fine stalactite formations.

Hillock's Mine is a disused lead mine through which there is access to natural passages. Entry is gained by two short pitches which will be good experience for those unacquainted with the use of rope ladders and tackle.

Mr Jenkins' interesting talk and excellent slides dealt with the last of those Cambridge University C.C. Expeditions to the caves of the Svalbard, which lie astride the Polar circle and near the Norwegian Coast. The Svalbard ice-cap still covers the surrounding peaks, and the narrow band of limestone (100' thick) in which the caves have developed exhibits a well bedded firm probably due to glation. The limestone is metamorphosed, and shows banding of blue and brown inside the caves. The caves themselves, of which Fosshullet and Piggy-hole were the objective of this expedition, were confined to the 100' thickness of limestone, and were deflected back whenever they impinged upon the bounding scree. There were no formations

The evening was concluded with a few slides of Agh Arwedd, where the speaker had spent a 14 day period surveying in the summertime series while engaged in survey.

Brigadier Glennie, President of the Cave Research Group of Gt. Britain, spoke about some of the caving he had done in the foothills of the Himalaya, north of Delhi. He described at length the habits of a colony of swiftlets found in the annex to a pothole, 170' below the surface; these birds build by egg-rolling the edible nests used for bird-nest soup. Of special interest was his description of a mode of break-through in phreatic systems. In Moira swallet and in the neighboring Toad Hole, separate phreatic air-like chambers were thought to have been joined by collapse of the thinnest part of the dividing wall when drainage of the lower chamber resulted in a withdrawal of supporting medium. The weight of the water above would then be sufficient to cause a break.
